Abstract

Papers on the cataloging of electronic resources have focused on Internet resources such as Web sites and not on electronic nonserial monographic resources accessed with a computer. Rules and standards for cataloging electronic resources have changed. This article discusses the electronic book as a unique resource. Practical instruction on the application of current cataloging rules and elements covered are control fields and variable data fields, uniform titles, title information, edition information, type and publication and distribution information, physical description and subject analysis.
