EVERY SCHOOL CHILD IN UTAH is familiar with the story of the infamous Mormon Battalion, a controversial wing of the United States Army commissioned in 1846 by President James K. Polk, but which vowed true allegiance only to the president and prophet of their church, Brigham Young. Consisting of some five hundred men, all but ten of whom were active members of The Church of Jesus Christ of Latter-Day Saints, the mission of the Battalion was simple: secure the Mexican province of Alta California for the United States and prevent the forces of Great Britain from gaining a toehold in the contested region. To some of the faithful, these citizen soldiers have been labeled "sell-outs" who eagerly enlisted in order to avoid the hardships endured by the larger body of Mormons who made the journey west without the benefit of the government larder. But to most, they are considered heroes who made possible the mass exodus of those they left behind in Council Bluffs and other way stations by not only physically opening the trail

west, but also by "provid[ing] urgently needed permission for the sect to settle for a time on Indian lands west of the Missouri River, giving the [exiled] Mormons time to prepare for the larger move west[, providing a means] to move five hundred followers to California at government expense[, and,] [m]ost importantly,... [through] the soldiers' pay[,] provid[ing] desperately needed cash for the dispossessed LDS church" (22). In this ambitious work by David L.
