First Things First: Rediscovering Bills of Rights

Abstract

The first annual Judge Irving A. Levine Memorial program was held at the Willamette University College of Law in Salem, Oregon, and the second annual program was held at the University of Baltimore School of Law in College Park, Maryland. The topic of the program was "States' Rights and Civil Liberties." In his speech, Hans A. Linde, set forth below, addressed the failure of state legislatures to decide questions of constitutional rights under their own state constitutions. He argued that the states' failure to protect constitutional rights under their state constitutions is unacceptable because state law protects the interest at stake. Justice Linde suggests that a state legislature faced with a constitutional question should always examine its state constitution before turning to the Federal Constitution.*
