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# Youth Movements: Travel, Protest, and Europe in 1968

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THE YEAR 1968 WAS A SIGNIFICANT MOMENT in the cultural history of European

integration. The events of that year marked a turning point in the emergence of a cohort of young people who had come, through travel, to conceive of themselves not merely as members of a particular nation, but as a continent-wide, transnational social group.1 It was a group based largely on age, and one that professed culturally internationalist sensibilities in addition to, and often instead of, nationalist sensibilities. As young Europeans traveled between protest sites, they expressed this solidarity explicitly; some even demanded the abolition of national borders and the establishment of a united Europe with unhindered mobility. Thus, one aspect of the general internationalism of 1968 was specifically Europeanist and was expressed within the context of ongoing European integration. The experience of travel within...

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
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
