Author's abstract: The Piscataquis River flows from its headwaters in Greenville, Maine south to the Abbot and Guilford area where it continues east to Howland at its mouth on the Penobscot River. The watersheds draining west and south to the river are included in a series of sporting camps. Development in this watershed began in the 1850s. Who were the proprietors? What was their life like at these sporting camps? How did people get there? In what ways did the sporting camps change the landscape of these sporting camps?
