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Abstract or Description

More Brilliant than the Sun: Adventures in Sonic Fiction is one of the most extraordinary books on music written. Part manifesto for a militant posthumanism, part journey through the unacknowledged tradition of diasporic science fiction, this book finds the future shock in Afrofuturist sounds from jazz, dub and tech hip hop and jungle. By exploring the music of such musical luminaries as Sun Ra, Alice Coltrane, Lee Peacock, Parliament and Underground Resistance, theorist and artist Kodwo Eshun mobilises their work in order to open the possibilities of sonic fiction: the hitherto unexplored intersections between science fiction and organised sound. Situated between electronic music history, media theory, science fiction and Afro-diaspora studies, *More Brilliant than the Sun* is one of the key works to stake a claim for the generative possibilities of Afrofuturism. Much referenced since its original publication in 1998, but long unavailable, this new edition includes an introduction by Kodwo Eshun as well as texts by filmmaker John Akomfrah and producer Steve Gooch and kode9.
